This year marks the 25<sup>th</sup> Anniversary for the Coalition for Construction Safety (CCS). Each year, we celebrate the industry's outstanding safety achievements at the annual Anniversary and Awards Celebration. CCS Safety First in Construction day is more than just a day of remembrance; it is a day we all stop and stand together as a **united front for safety** while we work to

When it comes to safety on the job, our choices can be the difference between life, disability and death. Think about your experiences. Can you remember events when your choices made a difference in the safety of a project?

Were you part of a good decision that eliminated a dangerous situation? Or perhaps you witnessed a choice made to play the odds that seriously injured a coworker? Perhaps it is a look back at the split second separating a near miss from a fatality. Regardless of the outcome, it all comes down to our power to make good choices.

In the world of safety, it is our hope and ultimate goal, that every worker will make the right choice to work as safely as possible, even when no one is watching. When working with a group, we encourage everyone to speak up and watch out for each other. It takes great courage to tell another worker about a safety concern. Have you heard the saying "if you see something, say something"? Easier said than done. People don't like to be corrected or feel wrong. This makes it hard to both give and receive safety feedback. Choosing to actively care about our construction family means breaking down that barrier. Find the courage to say something and know that choice made a difference, no matter how big or small.

As we stand here together today, look around at your coworkers. Our enjoyment of construction binds us together like family. Make safety, wherever you are, whomever you are with, whatever you are doing, a value that will never be compromised. Priorities change as we make our choices. Values shape our choices.
